erry Robert Horner was born in Devils Lake to Merle and Cora Horner on March 23, 1945. He was the fourth of ten children.

After graduating from Devils Lake High School in 1964, Perry earned a diesel mechanics degree from North Dakota State College of Science. He was drafted into the Army in 1966 and proudly served as a military policeman in Vietnam from 1967 to 1968.

Upon his return to Devils Lake, Perry enrolled at LRSC where he discovered a passion for acting. He earned an associate in arts degree in May 1971. During his time at LRSC, he met his soon-to-be wife, Patricia. Perry and Pat would raise two children, Chad and Travis.


After graduating from LRSC, Perry enjoyed the next several years of employment as a UPS driver and owner of the Mayer Properties (hotel/bar/restaurant). When a fire destroyed the Mayer, fate led Perry to his true calling—service to the community he loved.

Perry spent three years with the

Devils Lake Police Department before running for Ramsey County Sheriff in 1982, a position he would hold for the next eighteen years. During his time as sheriff, Perry was president of the North Dakota Sheriffs Association for three terms, a Search and Rescue diver and instructor, a volunteer firefighter, an EMT instructor, and a Boy Scout leader. He was a member of the VFW, the Lake Region Peace Officers Association, the Devils Lake Elks Lodge, the Devils Lake Area Chamber of Commerce, and the American
